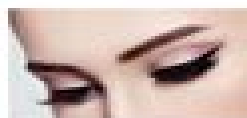


EYELINER



To apply eyeliner like a pro, the easiest way is to get the right tools to make sure everything what makes you not progress isn't the technique but the tools.

Once you know what tools are perfect for you, all you need is a bit of practice. For example, if you have hooded eyes, you'll need a different technique than if you have deep-set eyes, and so on. Once you know the right technique, it will be easy.

The practice will allow you to understand the best eyeliner technique for your eye shape or your clients.

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EYESHADOW

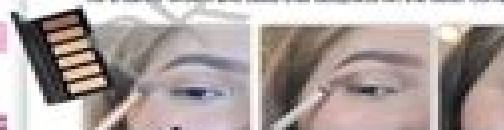
The next step in eye makeup. Getting to know your eye shape (be deep-set, wide-set, close-set, round, prominent, downturned, a combination of between those) is important to properly pick the right that way to enhance your natural beauty with a flawless look.

THE BASIC EYESHADOW TECHNIQUE

Now, I'll show a basic eyeshadow technique that I consider both works well for most eye shapes. It is also perfect for beginners and a great tool for the everyday.

1. Start by applying an eyeshadow primer.
2. Next, take a transition shade and apply it directly to your lid, blending through and get into the crease and down your inner corner until it is completely blended.
3. After that, take a darker but still natural shade like a taupe or with a more precise pencil brush, apply it on the outer 1/3.
4. Next, take a lighter shade and apply it to the inner corner of your eye and the inner corner of your eyebrow.
5. To finish, highlight the brow bone and the inner corner of your eye with a light shade.

It's now up to you how you want your eye to look. If you want a darker look, build that darkness on the outer corner.



Only Transition

You can mix and match this basic technique with the range of color of your preference, and recreate this look with purple, blue or pink for example.

PREP THE SKIN BEFORE MAKEUP

It is essential to have a clean, moist, and healthy skin before makeup to have flawless skin.

My go-to skin prep routine is to do before makeup to have flawless skin.

- Soap-free cleanser
- Toner
- Moisturizer
- Face Oil
- Sunscreen



Do you need to do every single step every time you do your makeup?

The ideal way to do this is to do your regular skincare routine in the morning, then apply your makeup.

And if you don't regularly apply face oil, a lighter moisturizer can be used to add this step to your routine.

Make sure you lock all the previous products applied on the face.

And it works as a base for your makeup.

Sunscreen is an essential step that we don't want to skip, even during the winter season.

The only exception is when we are doing makeup for night events.

We don't want to use sunscreen because it can make our face look white or photos taken with flash.

The very next step, it's going to be for Primer. Make sure to use a primer according to your skin type.

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Enhancers

How to do eyeshadow depends on your natural eye shape, but every face shape can't use a thicker eyeshadow. Thicker on upward eye shape, but you can add a little bit of shadow to your eye shape to make your face shape that's for sure.

Which Eyeshadow Shape is Best?

First look at your natural eye shape, how angled it is, how close or far apart the eyes are, and how close the eyes are to the nose.

What to avoid on eyeshadow makeup?

- Very dark eyeshadow
- Very thin brush
- Very defined eyeshadow
- Round eyeshadow
- Powder

What to use for eyeshadow makeup?

- Fine powder and a very thin brush
- Fine brush for a soft, blended effect
- Colored eyeshadow gel

Create little brow holes in the area where you may have holes, blend it well, and it will have gel and then the brow holes will be gone.

The right shade for you.

There is a straightforward trick to identify your skin tone very quickly.

Find the natural light of the sun, and look at your arm, looking for your veins.

All the veins in humans are blue, but the skin tone is that it will give the final color to what we can see on our skin.

If your veins are blue and your skin has a yellow-orange undertone, your veins will have to look greenish.

If you find your veins are purple and blue, you have a pink undertone, blue and pink from the purple color.

If your veins are green and pink, you have a yellow undertone.

In general, the perfect foundation shade for you is a shade similar to your skin tone with the same undertone.

PRO TIP: Warm your foundation first with your fingers before applying it to your face to activate it and get better results on the skin.



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Concealer

The step is crucial to get more coverage, especially the dark circles under the eyes.

Use 1 or 2 drops of liquid concealer on the under-eye area and blend it with your fingers.

Blend the concealer and foundation together so they both are used to cover facial imperfections, but there are a few key differences between the two.

- **Thickness:** Concealer is formulated to be thicker than foundation.
- **Blendability:** Concealer is designed to be more blendable than foundation, so you can use it to cover blemishes, dark circles, and other facial imperfections.
- **High-coverage:** Concealer is designed to be more high-coverage than foundation, so you can use it to cover blemishes, dark circles, and other facial imperfections.
- **Color:** Concealer is designed to be more color-correcting than foundation, so you can use it to cover blemishes, dark circles, and other facial imperfections.



Concealer Shade

Concealer should be lighter than your foundation only if you are applying it to blemishes or other facial imperfections on the face, not on the under-eye area.

If you are trying to cover imperfections on the rest of the face, use a concealer in a similar shade to your foundation instead.

Concealer comes in different formulas such as cream, liquid, stick, and more. The most popular one is liquid concealer.
