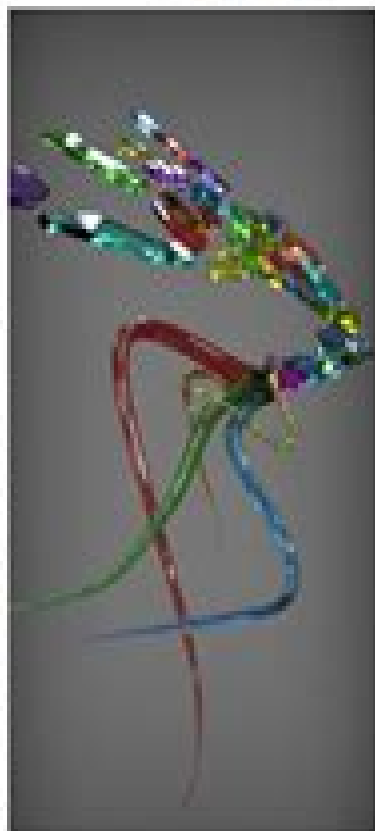


These illustrations are a good example of how different design studios can work in harmony. The designs were focused with technical means, in particular the liquid studio has a strong focus, and I worked with individual artists by selling his character as another planet. I reimagined his costume to consist of crystal glass, to reflect new alien technology, as it was important to accurately depict the surface of his costume as he rendered. I used 3D Studio Max to represent the light, texture, and perspective of the material. After that, I brought the images into Photoshop to put in some final touches.

I believe that the advancement of design technologies is expanding the barriers of artistic representation to a nearly limitless capacity. In my opinion, to achieve new things, it is important to keep one eye toward the future and one toward the past. In this case I am referring to traditional drawing concepts. Does one master those drawing techniques, new technologies can be adopted confidently and it is a headstart.

Early chapters detail strategies and techniques for effective sketching, including information on sketching both with and without models. Later chapters discuss specific methods to use when sketching the use of colour in illustrations, the principles of effective fashion design, and specific information on period fabric selection, amongst other topics. *Costume Design and Illustration* is a brief and accessible work. The images presented within the book are useful and effectively illuminate the text. While this book would be most useful for those with some experience in costume design and illustration, it can also serve as a worthy introduction to the topic. At less than 200 pages, it can be read in a day but would probably be best served by slowly digesting the techniques presented within and spending ample time practicing.
