2. Accurately label and categorize parts of a circle graph.
3. Interpret information presented in circle graphs to solve problems.

- blank paper and graph paper
- calculators
- worksheets with data sets for circle graph construction

**Introduction (10 minutes):**

- introduce circle graphs and their uses in representing data.
- discuss the importance of proportions and percentages in circle graphs.
