Social Communication Development and Disorders examines the integrated development of social linguistic and cognitive functions. It provides evidence based clinical information on effective assessment and intervention for individuals with social communication disorders. The second edition of this standout text is fully updated to reflect up to date research evidence and the application of the International Classification of Functioning Disability and Health Children and Youth version and places a strong focus on cultural differences in social communication and extended developmental information from birth to adulthood. Part 1 explores topics including theoretical perspectives on social communication neuroscience of social communication and social cognitive social emotional and social communication development. Part 2 covers social pragmatic communication disorder and associated disorders such as language impairment autism spectrum disorder attention deficit disorder and disruptive behavior disorder. Chapters feature case studies incidence prevalence estimates DSM 5 definitions referral guidelines recommended assessment and intervention practices as well as a list of clinical and instructional resources. This comprehensive and practical text is essential reading for both undergraduate and graduate students of communication sciences speech and language disorders as well as speech language pathology. Prominent researchers from the US Mexico Chile Colombia and Spain contribute experimental reports on language development of children who are acquiring Spanish. The chapters cover a wide range of dimensions in acquisition comprehension and production monolingualism and bilingualism typical development children who are at risk and children with language disorders phonology semantics and morphosyntax. These studies will inform linguistic theory development in clinical linguistics as well as offer insights on how language works in relation to cognitive functions that are associated with when children understand or use language. The unique data from child language offer perspectives that cannot be drawn from adult language. The first part is dedicated to the acquisition of Spanish as a first or second language by typically developing children. The second part offers studies on children who are at risk of language delays and the third part focuses on children with specific language impairment disorders and syndromes.

Understanding Individual Differences in Language Development Across the School Years J. Bruce Tomblin, Marilyn A. Nippold, 2014-03-26

This volume presents the findings of a large scale study of individual differences in spoken and heard

language development during the school years The goal of the study was to investigate the degree to which language abilities at school entry were stable over time and influential in the child's overall success in important aspects of development The methodology was a longitudinal study of over 600 children in the US Midwest during a 10 year period The language skills of these children along with reading academic and psychosocial outcomes were measured There was intentional oversampling of children with poor language ability without being associated with other developmental or sensory disorders Furthermore these children could be sub grouped based on their nonverbal abilities such that one group represents children with specific language impairment SLI and the other group with nonspecific language impairment NLI represents poor language along with depressed nonverbal abilities Throughout the book the authors consider whether these distinctions are supported by evidence obtained in this study and which aspects of development are impacted by poor language ability Data are provided that allow conclusions to be made regarding the level of risk associated with different degrees of poor language and whether this risk should be viewed as lying on a continuum The volume will appeal to researchers and professionals with an interest in children's language development particularly those working with children who have a range of language impairments This includes Speech and Language Pathologists Child Neuropsychologists Clinical Psychologists working in Education as well as Psycholinguists and Developmental Psychologists
