DIABETES INTERVENTIONS (Type 2)

Causes: Autoimmune destruction of the insulin-producing beta cells in the pancreas.

Signs and Symptoms:

- Excessive thirst (polydipsia)
- Excessive hunger (polyphagia)
- Excessive urination (polyuria)
- Unexplained weight loss
- Fatigue
- Blurred vision
- Slow-healing sores
- Frequent infections

Diagnosis:

- Fasting blood glucose > 126 mg/dL
- HbA1c > 6.5%
- Random blood glucose > 200 mg/dL
- Oral glucose tolerance test (OGTT) > 200 mg/dL

Management:

- Insulin therapy (basal-bolus or pump therapy)
- Regular blood glucose monitoring
- Medical nutrition therapy
- Regular physical activity
- Stress management
- Regular eye exams
- Regular foot exams
- Regular kidney function tests

Causes: Insulin resistance and relative insulin deficiency.

Signs and Symptoms:

- Excessive thirst (polydipsia)
- Excessive hunger (polyphagia)
- Excessive urination (polyuria)
- Unexplained weight gain
- Fatigue
- Blurred vision
- Slow-healing sores
- Frequent infections

Diagnosis:

- Fasting blood glucose > 126 mg/dL

Management:

- Medical nutrition therapy

Complications (Short-term/Acute):

- Hypoglycemia:** Low blood glucose levels leading to symptoms like sweating, shakiness, and confusion.
- Hyperglycemia:** High blood glucose levels leading to symptoms like excessive thirst, urination, and fatigue.
- Diabetic Ketoacidosis (DKA):** A life-threatening condition characterized by high blood glucose, ketones in the blood, and metabolic acidosis.
- Hyperosmolar Hyperglycemic State (HHS):** A life-threatening condition characterized by extremely high blood glucose levels and dehydration.

Complications (Long-term/Chronic):

- Cardiovascular Disease:** Increased risk of heart disease, stroke, and peripheral artery disease.
- Neuropathy:** Nerve damage leading to numbness, tingling, and pain, particularly in the feet.
- Nephropathy:** Kidney damage leading to decreased kidney function and potential dialysis.
- Retinopathy:** Eye damage leading to vision impairment and blindness.
- Foot Ulcers:** Sores on the feet that can lead to infection and amputation.

Definition: A chronic metabolic disorder characterized by high blood glucose levels over a prolonged period.

Causes: Genetic factors, lifestyle factors (diet and exercise), and autoimmune destruction of beta cells (Type 1).

Signs and Symptoms: Excessive thirst, frequent urination, fatigue, weight loss, and blurred vision.

Diagnosis: Fasting blood glucose > 126 mg/dL, HbA1c > 6.5%, or random blood glucose > 200 mg/dL.

Management: Medical nutrition therapy, regular physical activity, stress management, and insulin therapy (if needed).

TYPE	CAUSE	SYMPTOMS
Type 1	Autoimmune destruction of beta cells	Excessive thirst, frequent urination, fatigue, weight loss, blurred vision
Type 2	Insulin resistance and relative insulin deficiency	Excessive thirst, frequent urination, fatigue, weight gain, blurred vision

Insulin

Insulin is a hormone that allows glucose to enter the cells and be used for energy.

Types of Insulin:

- Rapid-acting:** Works quickly, used for mealtime insulin.
- Long-acting:** Works slowly, used for background insulin.

Administration: Insulin is administered via subcutaneous injection or insulin pump.

Monitoring: Blood glucose levels should be monitored frequently to adjust insulin doses.

Nursing Interventions

- Monitor blood glucose levels regularly.
- Assess for signs and symptoms of hypoglycemia and hyperglycemia.
- Provide education on diabetes management.
- Support patient adherence to treatment plan.
- Monitor for complications and provide timely interventions.
