What was before Darwin?

Aristotle -

Jean-Baptiste de Lamarck, 1800s

Refinement of traits, organisms successful in environment

Naturalist - collected thousands of specimens and observed various adaptations in organisms

New Insights

Darwin was strongly influenced by the writings of geologist Charles Lyell.

Evolution: Darwin's Theory

Alfred Russell Wallace

Worked in Indonesia

mid 1850's, developed similar ideas to Darwin

Presented to the scientific community

Soon after Darwin publishes *On the Origin of Species by Means of Natural Selection*

Controversial

More than just a hypothesis, theory

Verified by more than 150 years of research.

Evolution - Genetic change in a population or species over generations
